

Department of Counseling Performance Report
June 2018

The following program performance and outcome statistics are provided to the public and our stakeholders. This information is based on data gathered from 2014 – 2017 across all of our programs (Career Counseling, College Counseling, Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Gerontology, Marriage, Family, and Child Counseling, School Counseling).

1. Student Retention Rate: Over the period of 2014 – 2017, 206 students enrolled in our six programs. Of those 206 students, five students left their program (2.4%). Of the 70 students admitted in Fall 2014, all have graduated with the exception of 1 student who dropped (1%) and 1 student who is still enrolled (1%). Of the 53 students admitted in Fall 2015, all have graduated with the exception of 4 students who dropped (8%) and 3 students who remain enrolled (6%). Of the 37 students admitted in Fall 2016, eight students have graduated thus far and the remaining students are still enrolled.
2. Average Program Completion time: Of the students admitted in 2014 and 2015, 39% graduated in 2 years; 53% graduated in 3 years, 6% took 4 years to graduate; and 1% completed the program in 5 years.

Note: Between 2014-2017, no students enrolled in the Gerontology specialization, although some students did select Gerontology as an area of emphasis, which is not represented on the above chart.

4. Average Student to Faculty Ratio: 10.00:1
5. Estimated Cost of Program Attendance: Approximately \$8300 annually/25K for 3-year program (books not included)
6. Available Scholarships: From 2014 - 2017, the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant provided \$10,000 stipends to 67 MFT students in their final year of internship. The Rehabilitation Services Administration Long Term Training Grant (15K annually) was available to qualified students in that program. Additional Scholarship opportunities were available through the University for all students in the program.
7. Estimated Employment Rate of Graduates within 6 months of graduating: 95%
8. Eligibility for the Pupil Personnel Services Credential: Graduates in the School Counseling specialization are eligible to apply for the Pupil Personnel Services Credential in School Counseling issued by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing. In addition to the 60-unit curriculum, graduates must have passing scores on the CBEST Exam.
9. Eligibility for Licensure by Program Graduates: Graduates are eligible for the California License for Professional Clinical Counselors by completing the 60 unit curriculum in their specialization plus additional coursework. Marriage, Family, and Child Counseling graduates are eligible to apply for the MFT license through the California State Board of Behavioral Sciences (BBS), with the graduate degree being only one part of the overall process.
10. Programs accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) between 2014 – 2017: Career Counseling, College Student Personnel Counseling, Gerontological Counseling, Marriage, Family, and Child Counseling, School Counseling. The Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program was grandparented in on July 1, 2017, following the merger between CORE and CACREP.
